CLOUDS

Learning Outcomes

- To comprehend a simple poem about clouds
- To relate to the experience
- To identify the rhyming words

Summary: The child-speaker talks to the clouds in the blue sky that look like sheep to her/him. They look like white sheep going up a blue hill. The clouds move only when there is wind and stop when the wind stops blowing and look like sheep walking up a hill with the moving wind. The child then wants to know where the 'white sheep' are going.

Pre-reading

Begin by asking students if they have ever noticed the shapes of clouds. They may not have.

Explain that sometimes clouds are shaped like animals, birds and so on.

You may show some images or draw one or two images on the board for a better understanding. Make it a fun-activity by asking students to identify the images.







READING

Students read to comprehend and analyse

Play the audio track. / Read the poem aloud.

Explain the poem and then check comprehension.

Ask students:

Who is the child talking to? Are hills green or brown? (Both) Then, why does the child say 'blue hill'? (The child imagines the blue sky to

be a hill and calls it blue.) What do the sheep do when the wind blows? What does the child want to know in the end? What are the words that rhyme? (Let students underline the words that rhyme using the same colour)

Post-reading

Let students do the task under Going Further.

Instruct students to bring their colours for the task.

Ans: The clouds in the sky look like white sheep.

2. What does the sky look like?

Ans: The sky looks like a blue hill.

3. What happens when the wind blows?

Ans: When the wind blows, the clouds move away slowly.

4. What does the speaker see when she/he looks up in the sky?

Ans: The speaker sees the sky as a blue hill and the clouds as sheep on the hill. When the wind stops, the clouds do not move but when the wind blows, they move slowly.
